## How to use this prep book with your child

This book has been designed to help your child understand what to expect from their hospital visit. Using a character's experience allows for a gentle introduction to the idea of visiting a hospital.

To get the most out of the book and support your child's understanding:

- Follow the language and terminology used in the book to help keep things consistent and reassuring.
- Pause regularly while reading to ask your child if they understand what's happening or if they have any questions.
- Encourage your child to guess what might happen next or what they think the characters will do. For example, what toys might the character play with whilst at the hospital?
- Give your child the space and time to answer any questions asked in the book, and explore any thoughts they want to share.
- Use the book as an opportunity to open up a safe space for questions, helping your child to begin to process the information.
   Remember its ok if you don't know the answers to their questions – you can figure this out together with support from your hospital.

Following this, we would recommend **contacting your local hospital** to see if they have a Play Team. Play Specialists can offer extra guidance and help prepare your child in a way that's tailored to their needs and the environment of that setting.

People can also travel to hospital on trains, buses and by taxi.




When Esbug arrives at the hospital they look at the signs to help them find where they need to go. There are also lots of friendly people who can help them to find their way.







Esbug knows that there are lots of people that work at the hospital, who all have different jobs. They are all very important. Esbug would love to know how many of these jobs you know about.





Esbug has a look around the ward. The ward area has a play room and lots of toys to play with. Some of the toys are like Esbug has at home. This makes them feel happy and safe.




There is also a room for the grown ups to go to make drinks and food.


Some wards also have play staff. Their job is to help Esbug to understand what is happening, answer their questions and help them to feel safe, as well as having lots of fun together!


Esbug has had all the care they need and is ready to go home. Esbug is proud to have done so well at their hospital stay and can't wait to tell their friends all about it.
