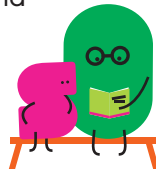
How to use this prep book with your child

This book has been designed to help your child understand what to expect from their hospital visit. Using a character's experience allows for a gentle introduction to the idea of visiting a hospital.

To get the most out of the book and support your child's understanding:

- **Follow the language and terminology** used in the book to help keep things consistent and reassuring.
- **Pause regularly** while reading to ask your child if they understand what's happening or if they have any questions.
- Encourage your child to **guess what might happen next** or what they think the characters will do. For example, what toys might the character play with whilst at the hospital?
- **Give your child the space and time to answer any questions** asked in the book, and explore any thoughts they want to share.
- Use the book as an opportunity to **open up a safe space for questions**, helping your child to begin to process the information. Remember it's ok if you don't know the answers to their questions – you can figure this out together with support from your hospital.

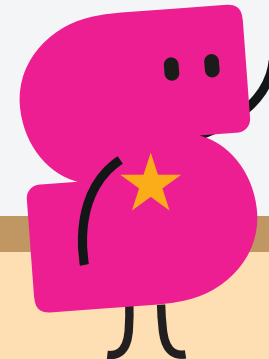

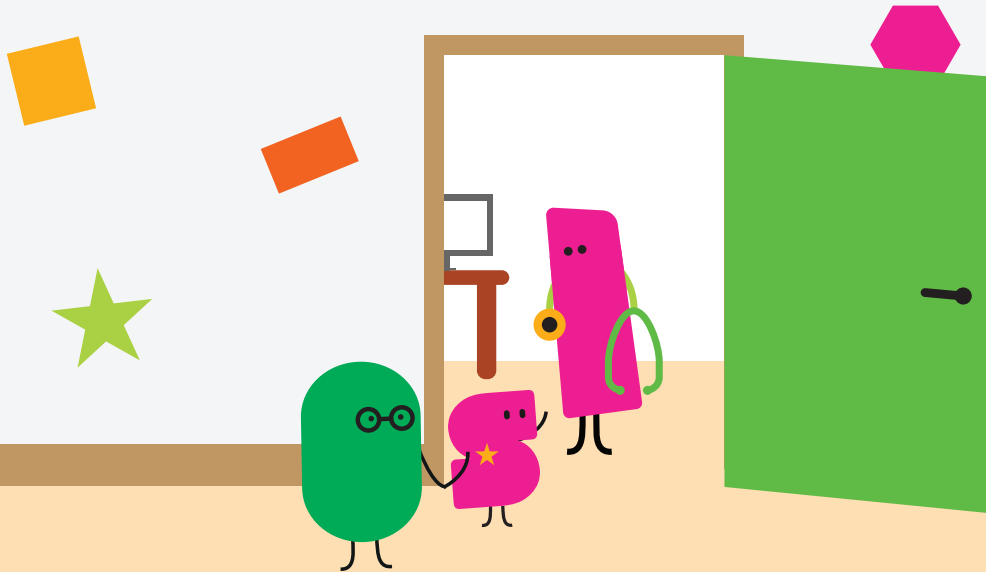
Let's help Esbug remember what they saw.

Esubug has seen the doctor now and is ready to go home. Esubug is proud to have done so well at their hospital visit and can't wait to tell their friends all about it.



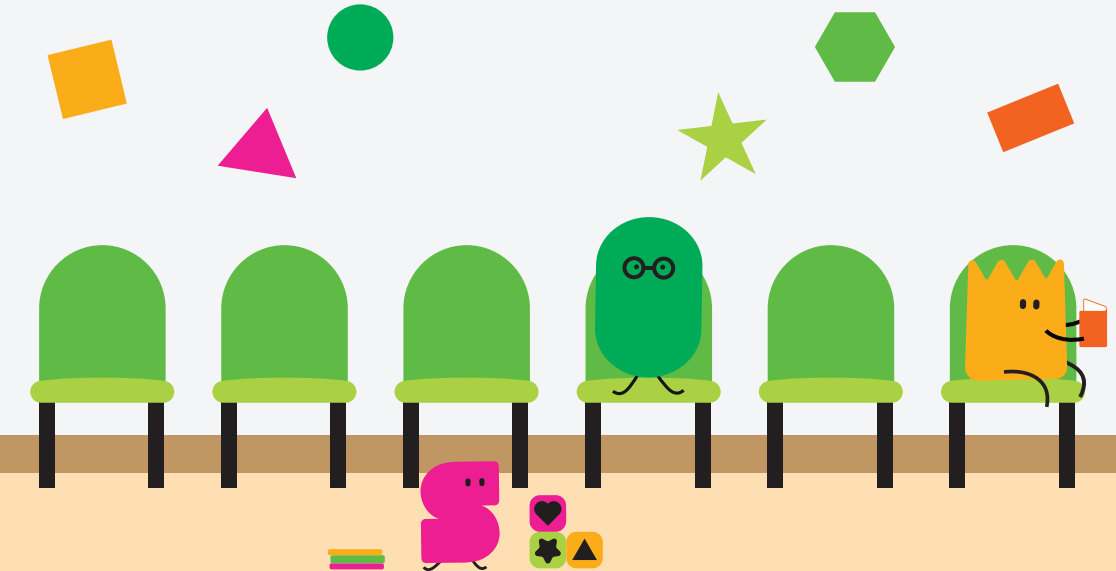
Esubug has arrived at the hospital.
Today they came in the car with their grown up.



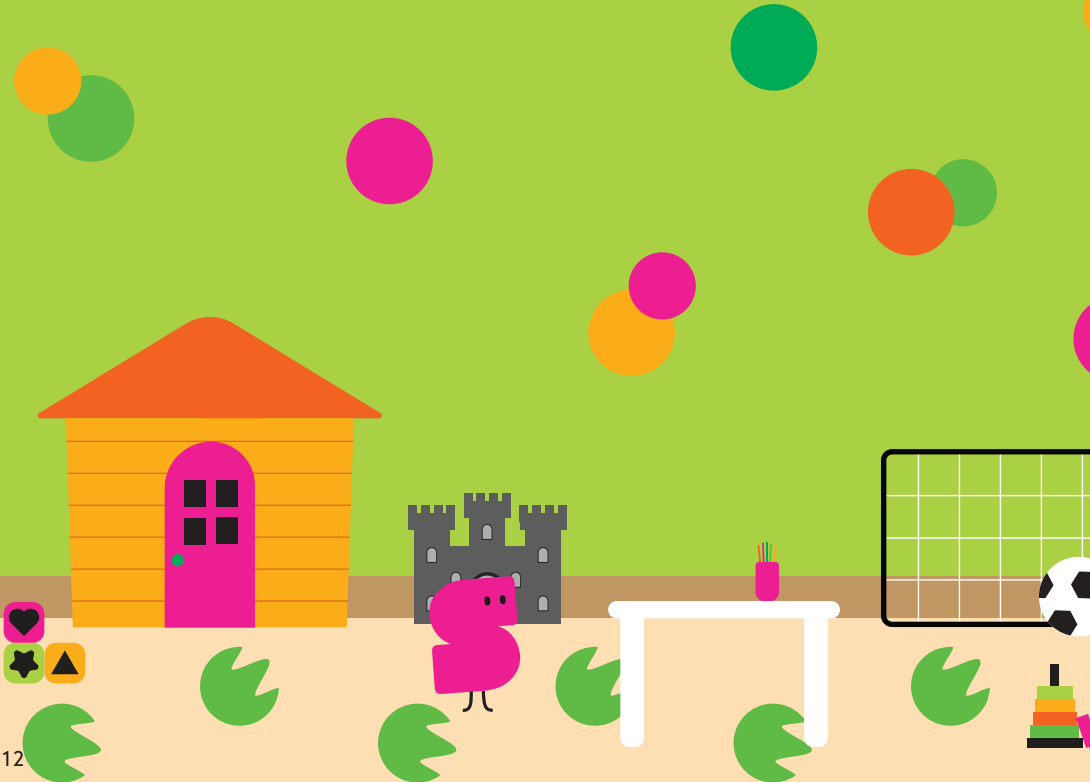
On the way to the hospital, they saw an ambulance with blue flashing lights. It was taking another child to see a doctor too.

Esbug is very happy to see that there is a playroom and lots of toys to play with!



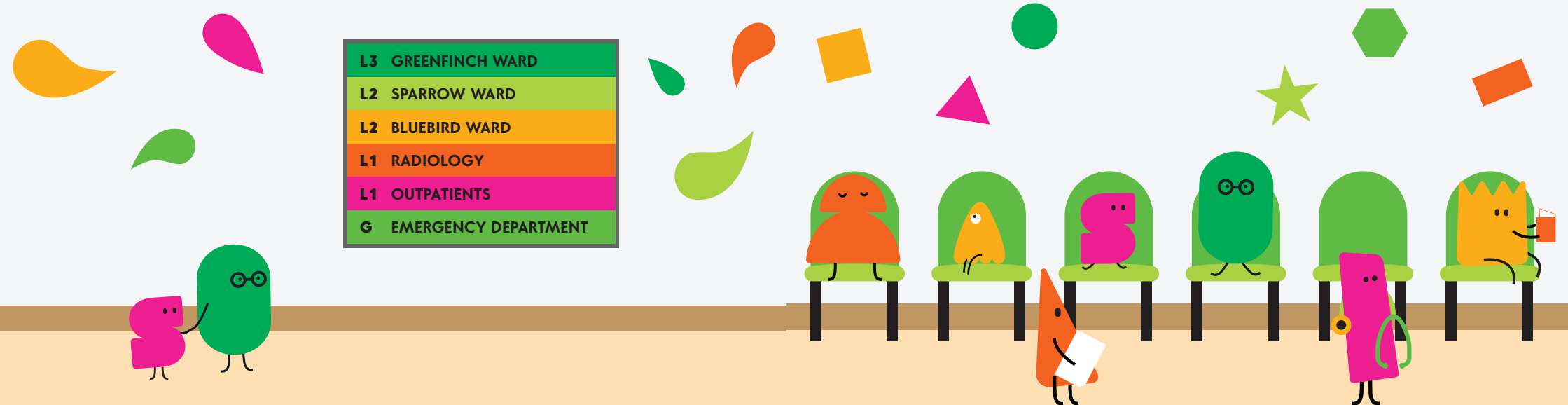
People can also travel to hospital on trains, buses and by taxi.



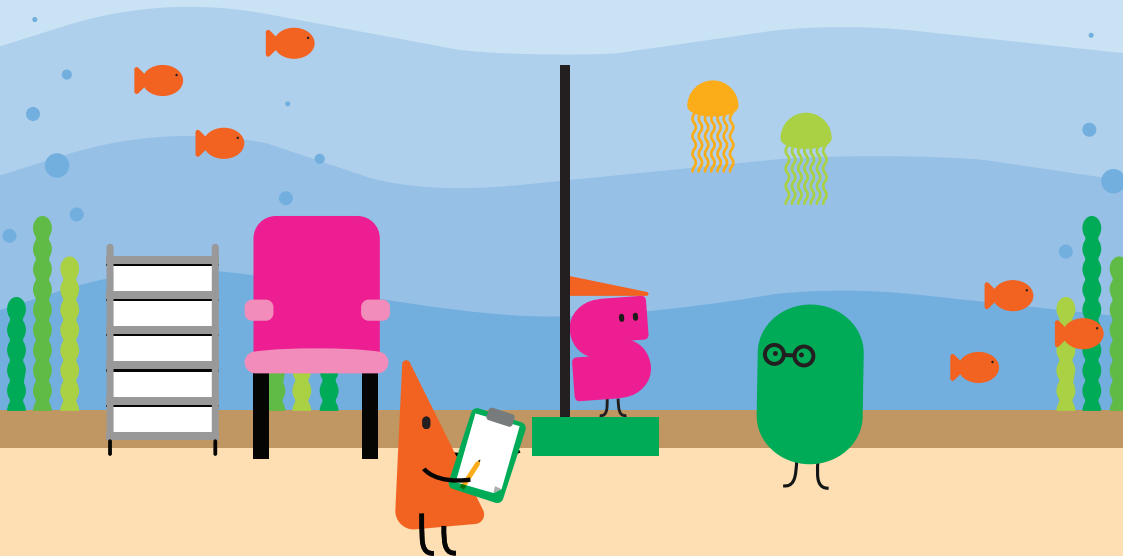
When Esbug arrives at the hospital they look at the signs to help them find where they need to go. There are also lots of friendly people who can help them to find their way.

Esbug is visiting the Outpatients Department today. This means they will just be here for a short time.

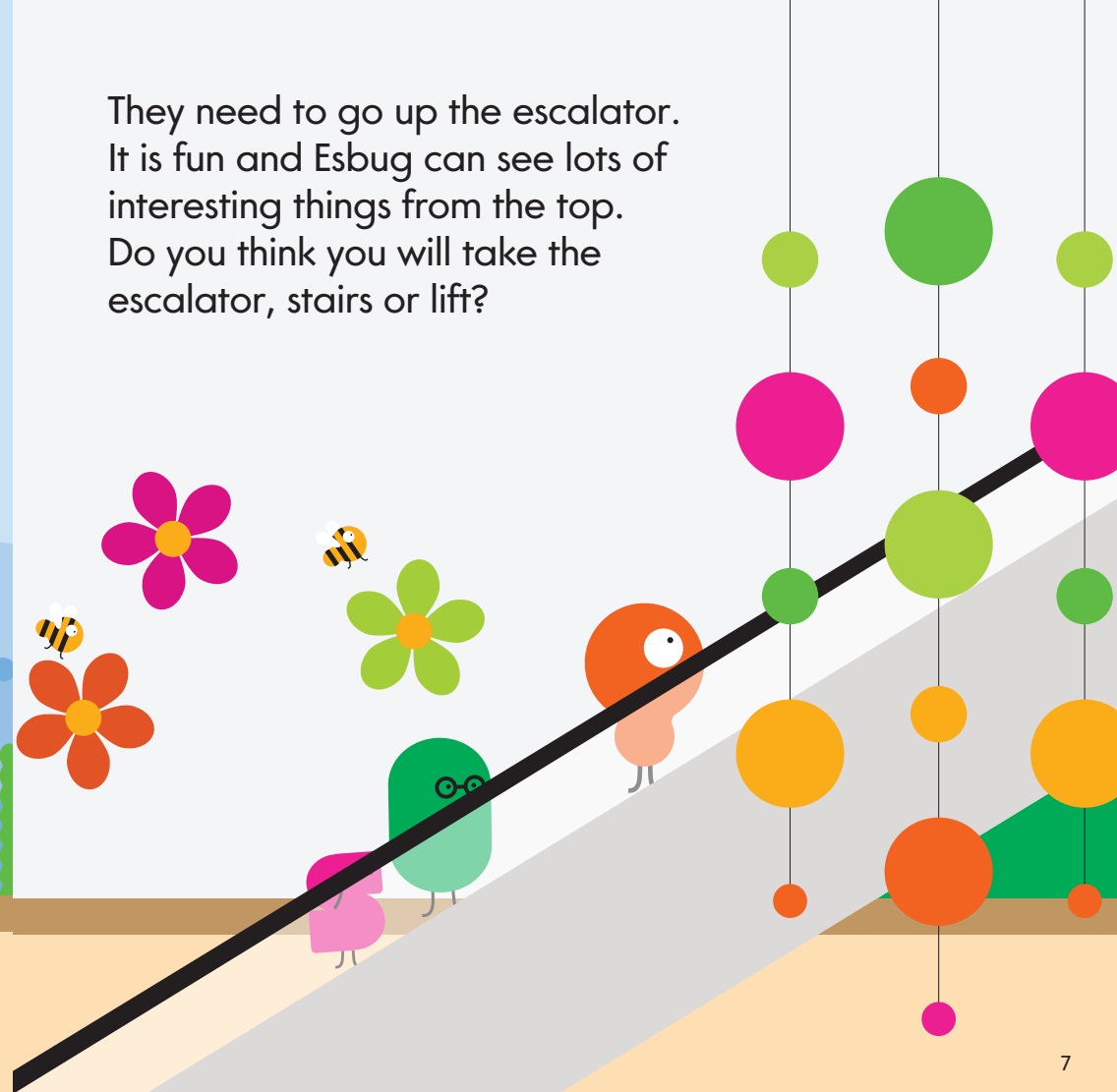

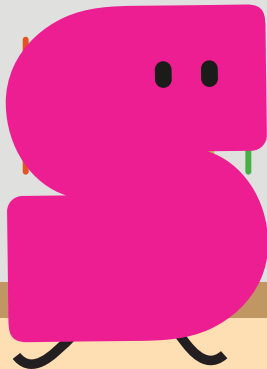
When they arrive at the Outpatients Department, Esgug gets their height and weight measured. This is really fun. Esgug has grown since the last time they came here.
